WEEKLY WRITING CORNER

Here are some quidelines to give students a better chance of being published.

- **1.** Keep length between 50 and 100 words.
- **2.** Follow directions for the topic. Creativity is great, but is the entry on topic?
- **3.** Make sure entries are legible.
- 4. Students' name, school and grade should be on each entry.
- Screen for appropriateness. We try to avoid potentially embarassing entries, but sometimes it is not obvious.
- NOTE: Teachers should include a note if an entry is exceptional for a particular student but might not otherwise stand out.
